he Nation Insurance Benefits particularly the pension benefits continues to be a major discussion point among TTARP members.

Members who have made their contributions through several employers, or worked and did not have their NIS contributions recorded at the NIB Board are now experiencing great difficulty in proving their contributions.

Members are advised to monitor their contributions while they are still employed. Ensure you know your NIS number and periodically take the time and get a print out of your contributions. This is your responsibility; don't leave it up to a Human Resource Department or your employer, you can also make enquires. You have worked very hard and contributed for your pension, this is your money, your pension, young entitlement.

For the 2015/2016 Nation Budget, TTARP again raised the issue of the National Insurance Pension that should carry a guaranteed period of ten(10) years. In the event of the death of the pensioner before 10 years have passed, the full pension should be paid to the beneficiary for the balance of the 10 year period. Secondly the NIS Pension must never be lower that the Senior Citizen Pension, the precedent was set in 2012 when the SCP raised to

> \$3000.00 the NIS pension also raise from \$2000.00 to \$3000.00.





Mildred Jeter and Richard Loving were an interracial couple in Virginia, USA very much in love over fifty (50) years ago.

In 1958, they took a trip to Washington, D.C., to get married. But when they returned to Virginia, they were promptly roused out of bed in the middle of the night and then arrested and sentenced to a year in jail. For getting married.

They made a deal with the judge to move to D.C. in exchange for their freedom, and while there, they eventually launched the legal case that would bring this kind of discrimination to an end.

Many times along the way, the Lovings made it clear they were not activists and really didn't want all the attention. They just wanted to raise a family as a married couple and live a happy life.

The landmark case of Loving v. Virginia changed everything, and the fact that their last name was "Loving" made it all the more fabulous.

By getting married, they directly challenged Virginia's Racial Integrity Act of 1924, which prohibited marriage between people classified as "white" and people classified as "colored." That law remained intact for decades because the Supreme Court previously upheld (in Pace v. Alabama) a law prohibiting interracial marriage in 1883. Loving v. Virginia reversed both of those and cleared the way for marriage equality for people of different races in every state.

You see, the Supreme Court pretty much tries to stay out of what states do and don't do with their laws, but it gets involved when the issue relates to the Constitution.

When multiple state or federal appeals courts are in disagreement (like with interracial marriage pre-Loving — or same-sex marriage until very recently) and the matter has a bearing on the Constitution, the Supremes can take the case(s) in order to provide a concrete answer. Once decided, it pretty much stays that way unless there's another period of challenges and appeals to a given law as our culture shifts over time. That never happened with interracial marriage, and it won't likely happen with the 2015 decision on marriage equality for same-sex couples.

Finally, Mildred Loving herself gave a short talk at an event marking the 40th anniversary of their victory in 2007. Here are her powerful words: Loving for All, by Mildred Loving

"When my late husband, Richard, and I got married in Washington, DC in 1958, it wasn't to make a political statement or start a fight. We were in love, and we wanted to be married.

We didn't get married in Washington because we wanted to marry there. We did it there because the government wouldn't allow us to marry back home in Virginia where we grew up, where we met, where we fell in love, and where we wanted to be together and build our family. You see, I am a woman of color and Richard was white, and at that time people believed it was okay to keep us from marrying because of their ideas of who should marry whom.

When Richard and I came back to our home in Virginia, happily married, we had no intention of battling over the law. We made a commitment to each other in our love and lives, and now had the legal commitment, called marriage, to match. Isn't that what marriage is?

Not long after our wedding, we were awakened in the middle of the night in our own bedroom by deputy sheriffs and actually arrested for the 'crime' of marrying the wrong kind of person. Our marriage certificate was hanging on the wall above the bed.

The state prosecuted Richard and me, and after we were found guilty, the judge declared: 'Almighty God created the races white, black, yellow, malay and red, and he placed them on separate continents. And but for the interference with his arrangement there would be no cause for such marriages. The fact that he separated the races shows

that he did not intend for the races to mix.' He sentenced us to a year in prison, but offered to suspend the sentence if we left our home in Virginia for 25 years exile.

We left, and got a lawyer. Richard and I had to fight, but still were not fighting for a cause. We were fighting for our love.

Though it turned out we had to fight, happily Richard and I didn't have to fight alone. Thanks to groups like the ACLU and the NAACP Legal Defense & Education Fund, and so many good people around the country willing to speak up, we took our case for the freedom to marry all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court. And on June 12, 1967, the Supreme Court ruled unanimously that, 'The freedom to marry has long been recognized as one of the vital personal rights essential to the orderly pursuit of happiness by free men,' a 'basic civil right.'

My generation was bitterly divided over something that should have been so clear and right. The majority believed that what the judge said, that it was God's plan to keep people apart, and that government should discriminate against people in love. But I have lived long enough now to see big changes. The older generation's


fears and prejudices have given way, and today's young people realize that if someone loves someone they have a right to marry.

Surrounded as I am now by wonderful children and grandchildren, not a day goes by that I don't think of Richard and our love, our right to marry, and how much it meant to me to have that freedom to marry the person precious to me, even if others thought he was the 'wrong kind of person' for me to marry. I believe all Americans, no matter their race, no matter their sex, no matter their sexual orientation, should have that same freedom to marry. Government has no business imposing some people's religious beliefs over others. Especially if it denies people's civil rights.

I am still not a political person, but I am proud that Richard's and my name is on a court case that can help reinforce the love, the commitment, the fairness, and the family that so many people, black or white, young or old, gay or straight seek in life. I support the freedom to marry for all. That's what Loving, and loving, are all about."

The couple had three children: Donald, Peggy, and Sidney. Richard Loving died aged 41 in 1975, when a drunk driver struck his car in Caroline County, Virginia.[5] Mildred Loving lost her right eye in the same accident. She died of pneumonia on May 2, 2008, in Milford, Virginia, aged 68.







Get off your Rocker and Get in to ALTA

So you have worked hard and reached that age. Time to start a second career, travel, do all the things for which you did not have time previously, or sit in your rocker and watch the sun go down, drink (preferably alcoholic?) in hand? But many of us question whether this should be the end of all usefulness to society. And voluntary activities are one of the most beneficial and rewarding directions to take.

So consider this. Trinidad and Tobago is said to enjoy a very high literacy rate but for many reasons – economic, family or social circumstances - many individuals arrive at working or even retirement age with inadequate reading skills and as a result have difficulty reaching their full potential. Sadly the formal education system has little programming to address the needs of that sector. And here the Adult Literacy Tutors Association has stepped in - preparing materials and organizing volunteers to run classes at a number of venues across Trinidad. The primary objective is to develop literacy skills - both for functionality as well as the enjoyment of reading, both of which we all take for granted. Can you imagine life where one has difficulty filling a form to renew a driver's license or apply for a job, reading newspapers, reading a menu at any food establishment that has become so much part of modern life? Most parents love to read bedtime stories to their children and now it is almost a must to help with homework. And now that you have time, what if the world of relaxation (with a good book or magazine) is closed to you? In this technological age, is it possible to live life without email, Google, Facebook, Twitter or texting, all of which are now at your phone-tips?

ALTA promotes literacy development on two levels: Classes where the rules of grammar, spelling, pronunciation and writing are taught, at levels right up to CXC standard (many students have gone on to pass CXC English), and Reading Circle – guided practice to build reading skills as taught in class. ALTA has thankfully been able to obtain (at no cost) access to library and school space (after hours), at which to hold classes in Port of Spain, East, Central and South Trinidad – there are approximately 60 centres where classes are held, among these around 13 centres where Reading Circle is also run. There is always a demand for volunteers to run these classes and training is provided at no cost by ALTA. Many volunteers have come from existing or retired teachers but teaching training or experience is not a pre-requisite; any proficient reader with the required time, interest and patience can become a successful volunteer. Tutors run classes twice per week while Reading Circle is once per week, both in sync with the school terms. Some volunteers start off in Reading Circle and later move up to tutoring but one can go straight to tutoring after the required training.

I am still a newbie among the volunteers, joining as a Reading Circle guide in October 2014, after a 1 day orientation and training. It was a little daunting at first but within a few weeks, with the support and guidance of ALTA staff and more experienced tutors, confidence began to build. One of the critical factors is building trust with the students – as a partner not as a lecturer. Now after 2 terms. I feel I am starting to make a difference. But as the senior guide in my reading circle says, it is a two way street. We get to hear and learn from the experiences of a wide range of people; their struggles and in most cases how they overcame

or managed their challenges. At a personal level it has brought me back to reading, from being an avid reader as a child to now mostly technical reading. I am once more reacquainting myself with the pleasure of reading, over and above functional aspects; and attempting to encourage that appreciation among the students – the turn of a phrase, the power of words and the pure fun in some reading. And in the short time I have been at this. I have seen skills develop in the students. English is among the most difficult of languages to read – so imagine the difficulty to new readers and their appreciation of your efforts.

So I encourage TTARP members and those who are reached by its magazine to consider ALTA as one way to volunteer and give back, as well as broaden your interaction with the wider society (both tutors and students). If you don't have two 2 hours to give twice a week as a tutor, just 2 hours a week (even if it is only twice per month) will make a difference in someone's life. Reading Circle guides can join at almost any time during the school year but tutors need to undergo a six-day training course (usually in April-May). These students truly make a choice to be there in the midst of all their demands of work, family and social life (compare that to many a student in the country's free school system).

Many people with literacy challenges are reluctant to seek help so if you know anyone, encourage them to join a class, there is probably a centre within reach of most people. ALTA believes that everyone can read. The theme for 2015 is No Shame. Go brave. Get in. Get through.

NEPAL'S CATASTROPHY

In the months of April and May 2015, Nepal (a country between India and China) was hit by two catastrophic earthquakes, destroying most of the heritage buildings, weakening the infrastructure of the country and rendering hundreds of thousands of families homeless just weeks before the monsoon season arrived.

This devastation is real and has drastically affected so many lives. The road to recovery is long and would require probably years of assistance to rebuild physically and emotionally. Many persons have stepped forward to volunteer their time, expertise and sometimes even their lives, to assist others in need, even half way around the world.

On-lookers may tend to focus greatly on physical needs, and while food, clothing and shelter is immensely important, other critical areas such as the emotional needs of victims of natural disasters and other traumatic events must also be considered.

Jonathan Page, who has volunteered in some of the world's worst disasters and has been involved in charity work in Africa for the last 12 years, arrived with a team of trauma counselors within a week after the first earthquake struck. Jonathan is a UK citizen, who has dedicated his working life to assist those in need, counseling those who have suffered adverse psychological, emotional and physical effects. Destruction disasters (whether by man or nature), loss of loved ones and irreplaceable belongings, often overwhelm one's normal coping capacity, and can cause severe behavioral, physiological, and religious/spiritual belief changes.

His team focused mainly on the emotional care of the survivors, counseling and comforting each and every person they met in their time of loss. They were also able to

provide much needed aid and support to start rebuilding their lives and homes. The team worked alongside many local charities and aid organisations distributing supplies, tents, food and blankets.

They also arranged public workshops to teach on how to cope with the emotional effects of Trauma. These workshops were attended by teachers, care givers and community leaders, who were taught on the basics of trauma counseling, to enable them to help their local communities.

Jonathan Page says "I can honestly say that volunteering my services in Nepal has been one of the most treasured months of my life. It was amazing to see unity in the people and genuine care and concern for each other, despite the tragedy. Even though some had just lost everything, even a loved one, they maintained a positive outlook and could smile through their tears."

There is some trepidation in returning to Nepal, especially since he was actually there when the second major earthquake struck in May, and in his own words, "It was very very scary". However, he feels compel to go help, and in a few weeks Jonathan



Page will be returning with a team to focus on long-term projects in Nepal collaborating with other organisations on the ground to assist with rebuilding the country.

Mango Muffins

INGREDIENTS

- 2 cups flour
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup sugar or 3/4 cup honey
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 1 cup milk
- 1 egg
- 1 -1 1/2 cup mango, pulp of (2 very ripe mangoes)

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Cut and peel two very ripe (soft to the touch) mangoes and reduce to soft pulp and juice. Combine flour, baking powder, salt and sugar in a large bowl.
- 2. In a separate bowl combine oil, milk, and egg.
- 3. Mix liquid ingredients with dry until just moist and stir in the

- 5. Bake at 400°F for 15-18 minutes.

Mango Chicken



INGREDIENTS

- teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon dried thyme or 3/4 teaspoon chopped fresh thyme
- 1 pinch ground nutmeg
- 1 pinch cayenne pepper
- 4 boneless skinless chicken breasts, about 1 lb
- 2 teaspoons margarine (becel)
- 1 ripe but firm mango, peeled and cut into chunks
- 2 green onions, thinly sliced
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh coriander
- 1/2 lime, juice of

DIRECTIONS

- 1. In a small dish stir together spices.
- 2. Sprinkle both sides of chicken breasts with spice mixture.
- 3. Heat margarine in a large nonstick frypan over medium high heat.
- 4. Add chicken breasts and cook, turning occasionally, until both sides are deep golden brown and chicken is no longer pink inside, about 10 to 15 minutes.
- 5. Add mango and green onions.
- 6. Cook, stirring, just until heated through, about 1 minute.
- 7. Remove from heat.
- 8. Sprinkle with salt, coriander and squeeze lime over.
- 9. Serve immediately.

Island Mango Bread

INGREDIENTS

- cup sour cream
- 1/2 cup margarine
- 1 1/2 cups chopped mangoes (very ripe)
- 2 large eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon rum extract
- 1/3 cup raisins (optional)
- 1/2 cup sweetened flaked coconut
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 teaspoon coconut extract
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups flour

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Mix sour cream and margarine together and then add mangoes.
- 2. Add eggs, sugar, then extracts, then coconut and raisins.
- 3. Mix dry ingredients (except sugar) together and incorporate into the wet ingredients, stir till all is combined well.
- 4. Pour into a greased large loaf pan (5 x10) and bake in a preheated 350°F oven for approx 1 hour. You may need to make a tent out of aluminum foil for the last 15 minutes or so to prevent it from darkening to much.
- 5. Remove from pan and cool on a wire rack.



Mango Shake



INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup plain fat-free yogurt
- 1 cup ice cube
- 1 large mango, peeled, pitted and chopped
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- mint leaves

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Place all ingredients, except mint, in a blender; blend until smooth.
- 2. Pour into 2 tall glasses.
- 3. Garnish each with a mint leaf

This accomplishment, now places Patricia as one of three Trinidad & Tobago representatives selected by the Trinidad & Tobago Scrabble Association to participate in the WESPA 2015 (World English Scrabble Players Association) Championship to be held November 4th- 8th 2015 in Perth, Australia.

The Championship is held biennially and is the most prestigious Scrabble Tournament which attracts players worldwide including countries such as England, U.S.A., New Zealand, Canada, Malaysia, Thailand etc.

In 1983, Patricia and her husband Robin (deceased 2005), cofounded the Scrabble Movement in Trinidad & Tobago along with two other Scrabble fanatics, and are the pioneers of organized competitive Scrabble in Trinidad & Tobago.

Their dedication for the Sport, was the driving force which resulted in recognition from the Ministries of Sport, Education and then Ministry of Sport, Culture and Youth Affairs. In the formative years Scrabble



was readily embraced by both the electronic and print media, and ample coverage was given for achievements.

Scrabble was established among the nation's schools culminating in the first Secondary Schools Scrabble Tournament in 1991 which was won by Patricia's son Robin Brandon of Fatima College.

In 1987, Patricia won her first National Scrabble Tournament and participated in the North American Scrabble Championship in Las Vegas. Over the past ten years she has represented team Trinidad & Tobago at the Caribbean Scrabble Championships in Guyana, Barbados and at home in Trinidad & Tobago. Team Trinidad & Tobago has successfully defended the trophy/title on every occasion.

In 2008, she successful earned the title of National Scrabble Champion of T&T. In that same year her grand-daughter, Tamara John- Seedial emerged champion of the National Secondary Schools Tournament and Patricia accompanied her to Malaysia where she participated in the World Youth Scrabble Championships.

In 2014, Patricia's second granddaughter, Tairah Seedial emerged the winner of the First Citizens Annual National Schools Scrabble Tournament on the heels of placing second in the previous year 2013.
