

ARIMA ZONE - Eastern Angels

Beautiful Barbados!

n the month of June, a group of twenty-eight (28) members of TTARP Eastern Angels from the Arima Zone (EAAZ) went to Barbados for a six day vacation. Barbados Beach Club was our destination.

On arrival we settled into our rooms and headed to the Oisten experience which is a very popular attraction with the citizens and tourists alike. It is a large area where people gather, food, drinks and even gift items are sold. The music filled the air and the creative dance routines by contestants is the height of this big lime which happens every Friday night. At times some members who are so aroused join the dancers on the stage. The rest of the weekend was spent touring the Capital City -Bridgetown and going to church.

The trip included a tour to the western side of Barbados, where our tour guide imparted historical and interesting information about the island. We learnt that Barbados is very much like Trinidad in being saved from hurricanes because of a scientific factor. Cherrie Tree Hill was the turning point of our tour where we stopped, disembarked for a short while and took photos.

We also learnt that the island's composition of the soil was prone to land slippage; that rocky wells were made to help drain the water from the land; that the sand used for construction is brown and not red; and that the vegetation took care of the soil erosion.

We visited the Morgan Lewis Windmill which was last used commercially in 1947. It is one of only two working sugar windmills in the world today, and so is now a Tourist Attraction. During the 'crop' season, February through July, its sails are put in place and it operates one Sunday in each month, grinding cane and providing cane juice. Around the interior of the mill wall is a museum of sugar mill and plantation artefacts, and an exhibition of old photographs. Visitors can climb to the top of the mill.

Some of our trip's highlights were: a cocktail evening; being in the heart of the city for the opening of Barbados Parliament; and shopping on Swan Street. Our members were a bit amused at the Barbados public transport culture, where you would find the mature drivers taking enough passengers to occupy the number of seats, but the younger drivers / conductors willing to overload the taxis by trying to pick up everyone. The pass word to pick up more passengers would come from the conductor who would smile and say "small up, small up". There was also no vehicular traffic only pedestrian.

Barbados is clean, beautiful and serene, a place where you can certainly get away from it all. The beaches are amazing because of the clear blue waters, and the Barbados Beach Club Hotel was ideal for: silence, breakfast, lunch and dinners.

Frugal Tips to Improve your Garden's Soil

Play in the dirt because life is too short to always have clean fingernails

~ Garden Therapy

hile some of us may only visit the garden to play with our grandchildren for others it is the place where their hobby grows. The Trinbago weather often causes the soil to go from one extreme to the other – either rock hard and dusty, to being wet and waterlogged and don't talk about the inevitable bachac/leaf cutter ants!

Looking after your soil can sometimes put you in added expense, but you can revitalise the soil by using a few gardening tips to ensure your garden soil is of good quality without buying mulch, compost or manure.

Grass Clippings

When the lawn is cut, ensure you keep your grass cuttings. If you have a lawn mower with a collection bag all the better – otherwise grab that rake and start raking up the leaves to one side of the garden. You can collect it over a year – ready for use next year. It will act as a mulch to keep the weeds at bay and the moisture in.

Ground Coffee for the Ground

In my house, we throw away a lot of used ground coffee. It's only recently I heard about adding the grounds to my garden soil. Firstly, you need to wash out the ground coffee, this will reduce the amount of acidity in it. Then just sprinkle the coffee grounds around the plants as a fertilizer and work it into the soil in the immediate area.

A New Way for Old Newspapers

Old newspapers have organic properties for the garden as you can use it as mulch. Simply put down a few layers of newspaper and weigh it down under soil. It will stop reoccurring weeds and thus you no longer need to go on your knees to get rid of those pesky shoots that you have to pull out like clockwork. For keen vegetable gardeners, you can use rows of newspapers in preparing the land to sow seeds or plant seedlings to maintain weed free rows. Do not use any pages from your newspaper that contain color print as it is harmful to your garden/soil.

Leave the Leaves

Most Trinibago gardens do have trees or leafy bushes that drop leaves, but instead of throwing the fallen leaves away, rake and bag them leaving them to become mulch. Interestingly, leaves that actually fall from trees are high in nutrients such as potassium, carbon and phosphorus.

Compost

Start your own compost heap by throwing your organic kitchen waste into a bucket or a container where you can keep it for a while. Use those kitchen vegetable and ground provision scraps, peelings, scraps from salads, teabags, cardboard egg boxes, egg shells and shredded paper. You now have a mixture of minerals, fibre and nitrogen which will keep your soil moist so you don't have to keep watering it every time the sun comes out.

Now, you know how to get your soil in premium shape, introduce gardening to your grandchildren and friends to grow vegetables and flowers. Soil improvement has never been cheaper or easier by just using what you may have ordinarily thrown out. You will be the envy of your friends, family and neighbours, so do share your secret so everyone can have great soil and a great home gardening experience.

Since that inception, the group now draws over eighty members to its monthly meetings which are held on the fourth Tuesday of each month.

We constantly affirm that, at this time of our lives, after years of devoted care to our families and careers, now is OUR TIME.

To engender an atmosphere of fun, at each monthly meeting we celebrate our members' birthdays with gifts and refreshments.

At several of our monthly

meetings each year we invite a variety of speakers to impart information on health issues. social issues, financial and estate management and many other topics to ensure that our members are kept well informed on matters impacting their daily lives. All national festivals are marked in an entertaining way - Mothers'/Fathers' Day, Emancipation Day, Indian Arrival Day and on Shouter Baptist Liberation Day we gather our extended families in the Hollows at the Queen's Park Savannah for a day of socialising, ole talk, sharing food, card games and sporting activities for the children. During the Carnival season our keenly contested Calypso competition brings out the talent of our members and we also, as a group, have great fun visiting one of the season's Calypso tents.

We wrack our brains each year to come up with innovative themes for our annual Tea Party. So far we have "had tea" in Texas, China and Hawaii. This year we will swan off to India.

Our eyes have been opened to the many varied places of interest right here in Trinidad and Tobago.



Some of these were Rancho Quemado Cocoa Estate, the Wild Fowl Trust and Nature Centre, the Asa Wright Nature Centre, Gasparee Island, Clifton Hill Beach, Harry's Water Park, the Pitch Lake and Vessigny Beach, the Angostura Complex and Butterfly Collection, La Vega, the Temple in the Sea, San Fernando Hill, Valencia Nature Resort, Los Iros beach, the Nestle factory and wherever the PTSC tour buses could take us. On two occasions we hosted Pembroke Tobago TTARP group and then visited Tobago to join with them for an enjoyable weekend which included a call on the THA Chairman. Mr. Orville London.

Our travel experience has even extended to venues overseas. We have basked in the sun on the beautiful beaches of St. Lucia, Barbados and Grenada. We have seen the wonders of the Panama Canal. We have cruised into the ports of the ABC islands – Aruba, Bonaire and Curacao, Colon and Cartagena. We are now planning a visit to Santo Domingo.

We do not ignore our spiritual upliftment, so each year about one hundred of us gather for a devotional Prayer/Breakfast, guided by a priest or pastor from the community.

We close off each year with a lavish Christmas Dinner where members come out in their finery.

Three significant milestones that we

marked with breathtaking ceremonies were our country's fiftieth anniversary of Independence and our group's fifth and tenth anniversaries. This prestigious event was documented in print in a booklet titled "Belmont's Golden Heroes".

To celebrate the group's fifth anniversary we distributed commemorative plaques to our foundation members, that small group of pioneers who set us on this path in 2005. At the tenth anniversary celebration, members were presented with beautiful commemorative etched glasses in a ceremony graced with the presence of local and national dignitaries.

But Belmont Bees is about more than just catering to our members' needs. We have moved out into the community in significant ways. For the last six years we have brought out each year seventy senior citizens and their care-givers from Homes in and around Belmont. We shower them with care and love and a delicious lunch to demonstrate our appreciation of their contribution to our society. And can some of them dance! We also take every opportunity to celebrate our centenarians, of whom there are several in the Belmont area. Must be something vital in the air!

The children of Belmont are not forgotten. Our members sponsor breakfasts at several primary schools: Escalier, St Margaret's, Melville A.C .and St Francis Girls' R.C.. Some members assist with various school programmes such as reading, lunchtime supervision, Girl Guides and the school bazaars. Then we hold a grand funfilled Christmas party for over one hundred children each year.

Our group is always upfront in the various activities spearheaded by TTARP Head Office. In fact we are proud past winners and finalists of the TTARP All Fours competition. We took home the title of Best Cultural Performance at TTARP's 20th Anniversary celebration in 2015 and placed second in the Cookout at that event. Several members diligently continue to be involved in TTARP's outreach programmes.

Over the years, unfortunately, we have lost some of our vibrant members. We mourn their passing and continue to express our condolences to the loved ones they have left behind.

We of the Belmont Bees live the mantra: "Enjoy the ride. There is no return ticket". One of our strengths is our retention of members. This has resulted in a strong historical memory in the group. Even as we add new members each month, many of our original members are still active participants and some even continue to be executive members. In that way we maintain a strong link to our past even as we move on forward. We must express our sincere gratitude to all our members who enthusiastically support our many activities and projects. We have also developed a cadre of sponsors without whose contributions we would have found great difficulty in achieving what we see as our mandate: to make the lives of persons in our community more fulfilled and happier for our having touched them in some way, either directly or indirectly.

Leaving a lasting legacy for future generations

- Her Excellency Paula-Mae Weekes

Ssuming duties on March 19th 2018, as Trinidad and Tobago's first female and sixth Head of State and Commander-In-Chief of the Armed Forces, never had she imagined that one day she would be sitting in the seat of the nation's highest office.

And though she is still adjusting to the new role and trappings that come with such high position, Her Excellency, Paula-Mae Weekes, is very much clear on how she is forging her way ahead.

"Not much rattles me," says Her Excellency, sitting comfortably in the upstairs foyer of The Office of the President, Port-of-Spain. "The adjustment has been incremental and I still have a long way to go. I have a naturally analytical mind and a result-oriented approach to tasks. This enables me to look at the big picture and decide priorities in the short, medium and long-term and formulate action plans. I am fairly determined, but adaptable in pursuing my goals." says Her Excellency.

She used this approach

during her distinguished career in the judiciaries of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago and the Turks and Caicos Islands, and will be using this same strategy during her current term in Office.

A former Bishop's Anstey High School student and alumnae of both the University of the West Indies, Faculty of Law, Cave Hill, Barbados, and the Hugh Wooding Law School, Her Excellency holds a Bachelor of Laws (Hons) and Legal Education Certificate.

Following her admittance to the Bar in 1982, she served in the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions for eleven (11) years, before entering private practice in 1993. In 1996, she became the fifth female judge in this country's High Court, working almost exclusively in the criminal jurisdiction before being elevated to the Court of Appeal in 2005. She subsequently presided at the Court of Appeal for eleven (11) years until her retirement in 2016.

Following her retirement, Her Excellency joined the Appellate Bench of the Judiciary of the Turks and Caicos Islands in September 2016, serving that jurisdiction until her resignation in January 2018 ahead of her Presidential nomination.

She is still very much buoyed by the public's "positive, hopeful and encouraging" reception to her Presidential appointment, but admits the "complete loss of privacy, freedom of expression and spontaneous movement" are aspects of the position she still juggles with.

But even as she grapples with these adjustments, Her Excellency is keeping her sight firmly set on the big picture and is already making changes of her own to the Office of the President.

"Firstly, I hope to make the Office of the President the model for the Public Service so that it would be characterised by efficient and effective dealing with all matters with which it must treat. We have started that process. Secondly, and not as far along, I want the Office of the President to act as a facilitator in identifying or recognising the work of individuals and organisations that aim to make us a better society, and where necessary to bring together those with similar aims," says Her Excellency.

That passion in making society a better place runs very deep.

Her Excellency explains: "I am deeply troubled by the virulent racism, the increasing intolerance of otherness, the difficulty in finding employment even for the qualified, rampant lawlessness and disregard for authority, job loss, and violence generally and towards women and children in particular."

She views the education system as a major player in tackling these societal ills as well as preparing young people for leadership roles and the world of work.

"The school's curriculae, however, remain largely academic with insufficient regard for the skills needed to feed the present job market. More focus is needed on personal and professional development and coping skills to prepare students for the inevitable vagaries of life," says Her Excellency.

It is within this context she admonishes young people in their quest for success, to set realistic goals and then strategise toward their realisation.

"If help is needed, identify the best source and ask for it. Next would be to surround yourself with positive influences and support, be patient and flexible and make sure to pencil-in time for rest and relaxation. Life really is a marathon, you need to pace yourself and make sure that you are fuelled physically, intellectually and emotionally for the long haul."

And what does a day in the life of Her Excellency looks like? Well, she is on the job between 7:30 a.m. and 8.30 a.m. and treats firstly with all correspondence and staff issues. Meetings would follow, including Presentation of Credentials, courtesy calls and swearing-ins. On any given day, in a response to an invitation, Her Excellency would visit a facility or attend an event, sometimes giving a feature address.

She leaves office between 4:30 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. and would, on occasions, have documents sent to her residence for review and signature. There are also the social aspects of the Office which, she says, often times involves her attendance at evening events.

These social outings, she says, are the ones which often give her many memorable experiences and can quickly recall, prior to her Presidential appointment, the times shared with others as a member of the Trinidad and Tobago Association of Retired Persons (TTARP). She has since most graciously accepted TTARP's invitation to serve as the organisation's Patron, as well as its offer for Life Time Membership.

"Apart from my 'old people' discounts," quips Her Excellency," TTARP's main attraction for me is the opportunity for regular travel to interesting places among a group of strangerfriends who provide pleasant company. I also had a trip to Cuba with TTARP which was a grand experience."

That Cuban trip, however, was but one of her many travels abroad. An avid traveller, Her Excellency has made quite her round of visits exploring foreign lands, and while she could not point to one that captivated her most, she listed Morocco, Kenya, India, Alaska and Thailand as her top five.

"The reason is the same for all. Having read or heard about them and seen them in documentaries, I was unprepared for how awesome and spectacular they would be to witness," adds Her Excellency.

As she reminisces on such amazing journeys, she encourages other TTARP members to never give up on dreams, but to always remember that "your time is always now!"

"It is all you have to work with," says Her Excellency emphatically. "While physical or other constraints might make it difficult for you to do all that you desire, there is always an adjusted version that can yield satisfying experiences. Join a group, take up a new and challenging hobby, actively seek out persons and places that add value to your life. As my Godmother would always say 'Be Prepared to Meet Your Future.' "

Hers is surely a future without borders and for which she hopes, even after her tenure as President, would yield "a more thoughtful, hopeful and caring society," with a lasting legacy for future generations.

Leaving the Corporate World – What next for the responsible female executive?

o you have climbed the corporate ladder, achieved your goals and are now well on your way to that much coveted period in your life retirement. But, before you embark on your journey to rest and recuperate, what about the career that you are leaving behind? The staff. the friends. the ones who became like family? Have you done enough to leave a strong legacy for the female executives of the future to follow?

As you may have experienced, women are still marginalized in the corporate world. Despite the many evolutions that have taken place socially and legislatively, women are still largely underrepresented in leadership positions, not just in Trinidad and Tobago but throughout the globe.

Forbes Coaches Council, quoting a report published by Pew Research on Women in Leadership, reports that only 5.2% of the female population are sitting in CEO roles at Fortune 500 companies in the United States of America. Furthermore, the situation remains essentially unchanged in Fortune 1000 Companies where only 5.4% of the female population are CEOs.

What is clear is that aspiring female executives are tasked with an assortment of challenges with which many of their male colleagues may never relate. These issues not only prevent them from achieving their career goals but also diminish their ability to succeed in business.

As a retiring female executive, you are afforded the opportunity to contribute to and make some groundbreaking changes in the corporate world, especially for upcoming women leaders and female executives alike. Your experience and knowledge do not render themselves useless upon retirement and neither should you.

Many executives experience complications after they have left the corporate world, having accumulated a wealth of knowledge and experience and no outlet to channel it. That sense of restlessness and uselessness can make retirement more unbearable than enjoyable.



However, with the right approach, retirement can put you in an advantageous position to negotiate the kind of corporate environment that you desire. You now have the time and with the right networks and resources, your life outside of the corporate arena can be spent evolving it.

According to Catalyst, a global non-profit organization designed to accelerate progress for women through workplace inclusion, some of the main problems that Aspiring Female Executives face are: Gender Biases and Inequality; Lack of Mentorship; Lack of Sponsorship and Lack of Strong Networks.

Forbes Coaches Council attributes these issues to the disparity between male and female executives and their representation in the corporate game.

There is the untold story of the "Glass Cliff" that Female Executives find

themselves upon, after piercing through the "Glass Ceiling". British researchers Michelle K. Ryan and S. Alexander Haslam have discovered that women were more often promoted into leadership positions when the odds were against them. In other words, women who managed to shatter the glass ceiling, found themselves staggering on a "glass cliff", waiting to open up under them; pushing them out of careers that they have spent their lifetime building.

Key examples of this are seen in Mary Barra's appointment at GM a few weeks before investigations commenced into their ignition-switch. Similarly, Lynn Laverty Elsenhans took control of Sunoco after a 52% fall in its share value. And, a struggling Yahoo hired Marissa Mayer to come to its rescue. A bitter-sweet moment for these Executives as one cannot begin to fathom the possibility of succeeding against these odds.

But how can these examples create opportunities for our future executives? As a retired Executive, what can you do with your inherited set of skills now that you are leaving the corporate arena?

Consider mentoring an upcoming and talented young female executive. Because you may have experienced the many challenges associated with corporate biases against female executives, you can now use these skills to coach and counsel someone to deal with the potential negative effects of having a seat in the C-Suite.


In addition, you can use your previous contacts and networks to help sponsor highly qualified women by speaking up on their behalf. Before you leave your position, spend some time listening to the females in your workspace. Are they happy with the status quo? What are their accomplishments? Do they feel included? Are their innovative ideas defended and supported?

Start using your position of influence to advocate for the advancement of the women behind you. Mentorship without sponsorship is of no merit. To overcome the gender inequality and biases in the corporate field, women need sisterhood and someone to give them visibility. Talk about their accomplishments behind closed doors. Promote their talents and unique skills for major opportunities that can really allow them to shine. That way, the Corporate Bias can be used as an advantage when they finally manage to shatter the glass ceiling because their competencies would have preceded their appointments.

Finally, building a strong network and joining associations like AFETT after retirement will give you a platform to advocate for change and would also introduce you to many other young professionals much in need of your mentorship and sponsorship to help them navigate the seas of professional development and personal growth. So although the prospect of leaving your seat at the table may seem daunting, consider the wealth of opportunities that this stage in your life is affording you as you pave the way for those behind you!


- 6. Understand your investment options-Do your research and understand your investment options, do not allow anyone to rush you into making any financial decisions.

MY DOCTOR RECOMMENED SURGERY. SHOULD I GET A SECOND OPINION? by Marlon Mencia

Sam frequently asked by patients to provide a second opinion on a problem. Orthopaedic care is becoming increasingly more sophisticated and patients and physicians alike are confused by the myriad of options available to treat many conditions. With highly self-opinionated surgeons and conflicting medical evidence, often lacking in scientific rigor, the situation has led to the increasing use of second opinions in health.

A second opinion is essentially another viewpoint on the same problem by a specialist in the field. A recent study published in 2017 revealed that orthopaedic surgeons are the number one sought out specialists when it comes to a second opinion. With 38% of patients doing so because they had doubts about their initial diagnosis or treatment and 19% feeling dissatisfied with the level of communication from the specialist. Interestingly, a staggering 84% were satisfied with the second opinion provided.

There is little wonder that patients seek a second opinion on issues of diagnostic uncertainty when a 2014 study in the British Medical Journal of Quality and Safety found a rate of misdiagnosis of 1 in 20 adults, many of which had the potential to cause serious harm.

The use of the internet as a source of medical information has steadily increased over the years with up to 50% of patients conducting internet searches for information, in fact Dr. Google may well be the most popular second opinion source despite the variable veracity of its information.

PinnacleCare®provides an online second opinion service to patients that transcends geographic barriers, utilizing specialists at leading medical centers throughout the United States. Amongst the five situations in which they advise that patients should always seek a second opinion are:

- i. When surgery is recommended and
- ii. When the diagnosis or course of treatment is unclear.

Although most surgeons agree with the benefits of a second opinion, some still believe that its value is overrated and represents a waste of time and money. Patients should be wary of second opinions from surgeons in a group practice since such opinions are frequently subject to other influences and may not be independent or objective.

My experience locally tells me that the rate of second opinions is increasing, the main reason being a lack of communication between the surgeon and the patient particularly when surgery is recommended. The medical landscape has evolved, and there are many more specialists from whom patients can choose to receive care.

Patients seeking a second opinion should first seek out an exemplary specialist or subspecialist who can provide a clear and honest appraisal of the patient's problem so to allow the patient to make an informed decision. Open, transparent and respectful communication is key to this process. I fully endorse the use of a second opinion, it is a legitimate and empowering tool to the patient and one that should be embraced in a Patient Centered HealthCare System.

The History of La Brea Black Gold Seniors

he now troubled village of La Brea, was once a bustling enterprising commercial port where according to our village historian, the first US embassy in Trinidad was situated there. The port at Brighton, La Brea was the point from which our natural product "pitch" was packed into barrels and sent to major countries of the world. This wonder of the world was first discovered by Sir Walter Raleigh in 1595 when he needed to caulk his leaking vessels and since then its uses have varied from the production of records in the music industry to surfacing of road and airport tarmac around the world.

The village of La Brea is diverse in its origin. As early as the 1900's there is evidence that religion was an important element in the fabric of its society. The stones found on the old Methodist church tell many a story. There were about five 'Lodges' many Baptist camps, and each Christian religion was represented in the area. The name 'Vanderburg' found on the church stone reminds the La Brea people when foreigners were an integral part of our society. The foreigners brought the management skills needed for the commerce that resulted from having oil wells and two ports in the area, one operated by British

Petroleum and the other by Lake Asphalt and Texaco. These corporate entities assisted their employees with housing and some of the now residents of La Brea were uprooted from various areas and replanted here in La Brea. There is a saying that 'Chinese are only a part of the Landscape when there is prosperity'. La Brea once boasted that there were about twenty Chinese shops and this may account for a village in La Brea called Chinese village. It was also a fishing port and so small islanders entered and settled along the coast line surrounding the Pitch Lake with the hope of making a living in this part of the Land.

The tall building which still stands in the village just west of the pitch lake is known as "The tower" by everyone. This is a reminder of the housing that was given in the 1940's to the employees who worked with the oil companies that drilled in the area. The "barracks" as they were called were constructed with a strong wood which when demolished in the 1960's it was a material that was sought by most to construct houses of their own; many of these houses are still standing today.

Today the members of our







group La Brea Black Gold Seniors (TTARP La Brea Zone)came from these diverse beginnings.

Our first meeting was held on May 11, 2011 at the Brighton Sports Club, a building given to the community by Texaco. It is was our inaugural meeting in which Mr. Navarro and Mr. Sylvan (deceased) from the Fyzabad Zone introduced the concept of TTARP zonal group. We moved guickly and at that same meeting an executive was elected. We go on outings to various places of interest, have weekly sessions of ball room dancing which provided some much needed exercise. Recipe

Mushroom Chicken & Quinoa

This mushroom chicken and quinoa recipe is flavorful, satisfying, and healthy too! Ready in only 30 minutes, it's the perfect recipe for a busy weeknight.

YIELD: 4–6 servings PREP TIME: 10 minutes COOK TIME: 15 minutes TOTAL TIME: 30 minutes


INGREDIENTS:

- 2 cups low-sodium chicken stock
- 1 cup uncooked quinoa
- · 2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil, divided
- 1 pound boneless, skinless chicken breasts, cut into 1-inch cubes
- 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt, divided
- 24 ounces baby bella mushrooms
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh thyme
- 1/4 cup freshly grated parmesan cheese, plus additional for serving

DIRECTIONS:

1. Bring 2 cups chicken stock to a gentle boil. Add the quinoa, return to boil, then reduce the heat to a simmer, cover, and let cook until most of the liquid is absorbed, 12 to 15 minutes. Remove from heat and let stand until the remaining liquid is absorbed, about 10 additional minutes. Fluff with a fork and set aside. (Note: This step may vary slightly depending upon your particular brand of quinoa. Be sure to check the directions.)

2. Heat 1 tablespoon olive oil in a skillet over medium high. Sauté chicken with 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt until chicken is cooked through and no longer pink, about 4 to 6 minutes.




3. Remove the chicken to a plate lined with paper towels, then with a paper towel gently wipe the skillet clean. Heat the remaining 1 tablespoon olive oil over medium high. Add the mushrooms, remaining 1/4 teaspoon salt, and black pepper. Cook, until the mushrooms begin to brown, about 3 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add the garlic and cook until the mushrooms are tender and have given up their liquid, 4 additional minutes. If there is a lot of remaining liquid in the pan, increase the heat and cook just until most of the liquid has evaporated, about 1 minute. Stir in the thyme, quinoa, chicken, and 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese. Serve warm, sprinkled with additional Parmesan.

Store leftovers in an airtight container in the refrigerator for up to 4 days.

TTBS in partnership with UNIPET is giving motorists the assurance they can purchase fuel with full confidence knowing they're receiving exactly what was paid for.

Fuel dispensers at UNIPET service stations nationwide, will be affixed with a yellow **"PASSED"** sticker once the verification is completed. Thus confirming accuracy by the Legal Metrology Inspectorate (LMI) of the TTBS. Verification checks on the fuel dispensers will be conducted every six months.

Where the fuel dispensers does not meet the criteria of providing an accurate reading it will be removed



from service to the public and a "**NOT FOR USE IN TRADE**" sticker would be placed on the device.

On June 4th, 2018, The Trinidad and Tobago Bureau of Standards (TTBS) through the Metrology Act commenced Fuel Verification at the UNIPET Service Station in Brentwood Chaguanas. The Act requires that measuring devices used for trade such as fuel dispensers, be tested for accuracy, i.e., verified.
