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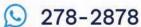
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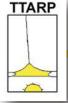

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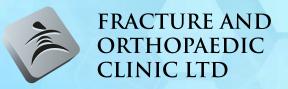
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Back and Leg Pain

Causes, Management and when to consider surgery.

Back and leg pain are common afflictions that can significantly impact your quality of life. The relationship between these types of pain and knowing when to consider surgical options can help you make informed decisions about your health.

The origins of back pain often lie in muscle strains, spinal abnormalities like herniated discs, and degenerative conditions such as osteoarthritis. Other causes can include fractures, spinal tumours (primary or metastatic) and infection.

When a herniated disc or other spinal issues impinge on spinal nerves, it can lead to leg pain, commonly known as sciatica. This pain radiates from the lower back through the leg and can be accompanied by altered sensations like numbness, tingling, and burning.

A sedentary lifestyle, poor posture, and obesity exacerbate these conditions. Inadequate physical activity weakens core muscles that support the spine, increasing susceptibility to back and leg pain.

Preventative strategies are essential in managing these issues. Regular exercise is crucial, emphasising strengthening core muscles and maintaining flexibility through disciplines like yoga or pilates. Ergonomically sound furniture can also mitigate the risk, particularly for those in sedentary occupations.

When pain persists despite conservative treatments such as physical therapy, medication, or lifestyle modifications, it may be time to consider surgical intervention if appropriate. Surgery is often reserved for severe cases where non-surgical management has failed or there is evidence of loss of function, including limb weakness, bowel/ bladder dysfunction and problems with balance and walking.

Surgical procedures aim to relieve pressure on nerves and/ or stabilise the spine. Advances in minimally invasive spine techniques offer reduced recovery times and less postoperative discomfort, making surgery a viable option for those enduring chronic, debilitating pain.

Back and leg pain are common and prevalent issues; understanding the underlying causes and exploring various treatment options, including surgery, can help manage symptoms and improve quality of life. Consulting with your doctor is vital to tailor a treatment plan that suits your needs. Remember, proactive management and informed decisions are key to optimal health.

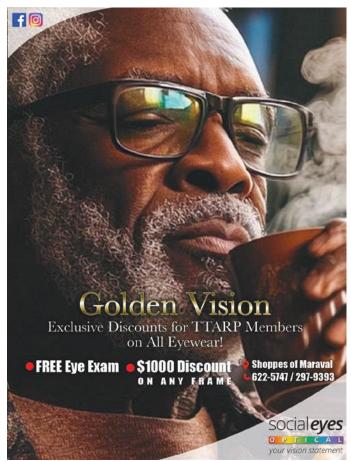

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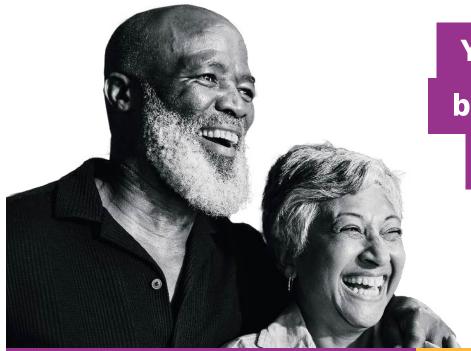

BENEFITS FOR PERSONS AGED 60 YEARS AND OVER

The following are TTARP's Recommendations to the Government of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago (GORTT) and others on behalf of Senior Citizens which are now in effect :-

- Fee Exemption for the renewal of a Trinidad and Tobago Passport.
- Fee Exemption for the renewal of a Trinidad and Tobago Driver's Permit.
- Exemption from Trinidad and Tobago Airport Departure Tax on Airline Tickets 4. Tax Exemption on premium payments for General Insurance Policies
- (e.g. House and Car)
- 5. Free PTSC bus rides in Trinidad and Tobago with presentation of Driver's Permit or National Identification Card.
- 6. Free rides on the Water Taxi between POS and San Fernando Tobago with presentation of Driver's Permit or National Identification Card.
- 7. Fee Exemption on certain bank services (e.g. Bank Drafts and bank
- 8. Preferential rates on fixed deposits at Financial Institutions.
- 9. Increased range of CDAP medications for ailments common to Senior Citizens
- 10. Extended Medical Care hours of services at Public Health Centers from 7am to 4pm, to 7am to 7pm, and in certain areas from 7am to 10pm.
- 11. The Senior Citizen Grant has been increased to \$3,500 (max) per month dependent on a means test for other Retirement Income from NIS and Occupational Pensions which must not exceed \$5,500 per month.
- 12. Retired Government employees will now receive an interim pension of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500) per month, while their pension records are being processed. When verified, the retired employee will receive the correct pension and a lump sum for arrears.
- 13. Residents of Trinidad and Tobago, both nationals and non-nationals, will no longer be required to submit a Life Certificate twice per year to continue receiving their NIS Pensions.
- 14. Retired Government Pensioners, who are nationals of Trinidad and Tobago, will no longer be required to present themselves as proof of life existence if they submit their birth certificate PIN number to the Pension Management Branch, Treasury Division.
- 15. Walk-Over constructed in Port of Spain, with a wheelchair ramp, to assist senior citizens and others travelling to and from the Tobago Ferry Port and Water Taxi service.

OTHER

In context of approved GORTT National Budget 2023/2024 the following are some additional improvements which Senior Citizens (and Others) shall enjoy :-

- a) All first-time home owners will qualify for a tax-free allowance of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000).
- b) Employed persons will benefit from a personal tax deduction allowance up to a maximum sum of \$60,000 on combined contributions to approved pension funds, annuity plans, and National Insurance.
- c) Value Added Tax (VAT) has been removed from many basic food items, such as biscuits, cooking oil, canned vegetables, canned meat and fish, cornflakes, curry, juice, sausages, ham, ketchup, pigtail, and bottled water.
- d) Electricity and Water rate rebates to be increased from 25% to 35% for bills LESS THAN Three Hundred Dollars
- e) Removal of VAT and Duties on therapy equipment for treatment of vision, hearing and physical disabilities.
- Removal of VAT and Import duties on computer equipment which should make these important communication devices cheaper.
- g) All Citizens will have access to Free WIFI internet connections at Transport Hubs, Public Hospitals, Schools and Libraries.
- h) Increase non-taxable Annual Income allowances to \$90,000 for all citizens.
- All taxes (including Customs Duty, Online Purchase Tax and Value Added Tax) on individual components in CCTV systems, including cameras and DVRs, are waived with effect from January 1st 2023.
- j) There is a collaboration between the Ministry of Social Development & Family Services, iGovTT and TTConnect to allow senior citizens to submit their Life Declaration Certificate Form by calling the toll free number 800-8826 for an appointment.

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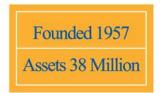

When you hear the name Lynette Seebaran-Suite, thoughts of the law immediately come to mind. This connection isn't coincidental!

As an Attorney-at-Law, Seebaran-Suite has leveraged her decades of experience and extensive network across civil society and government to help introduce groundbreaking legislation in our local legal framework.

But what truly makes Seebaran-Suite synonymous with the Law is her dedication to advocating for the rights of women, children and vulnerable groups. She also possesses a unique talent for breaking down complex legislations and communicating them effectively.

With such fervor for advocacy and research, combined with a passion for sharing information, Seebaran-Suite has engaged in a long career of voluntary public service and activism, alongside her extensive legal practice.

"I grew up in a household steeped in the philosophy of social consciousness and public service. Both my parents were activists - my father in politics and my mother as a trade unionist," said the 69-year-old Seebaran-Suite.

Despite her early inclination toward advocacy, she didn't give it much thought at the time. But as fate would have it, her studies in Law unknowingly laid a solid foundation for her future achievements.

After graduating Holy Name Convent, she enrolled at the newly established Faculty of Law at the University of the West Indies (UWI) in Barbados.

In 1975 she graduated with an LLb First Class Honours and after completing her studies at Hugh Wooding Law School in 1977, she was called to the Bar specializing in Family Law.

Fate would again play another pivotal role in her journey, securing her a position at the Law Reform Commission.

"As a Legal Research Officer, I was part of a team responsible for updating the country's 1976 laws. This experience provided me with a comprehensive understanding of our legal



system," Seebaran-Suite recalled.

Armed with this knowledge, she was soon invited to join the private practice at Chambers led by Michael De La Bastide QC.

This marked a pivotal stage in Seebaran-Suite's career, finding herself fiercely and passionately lending her voice, advocating for the rights of women, children and the vulnerable.

Said Seebaran-Suite: "At that time, the women's movement was gaining momentum globally. I immersed myself in the feminist literature of the day while championing other causes such as land tenants' rights, workplace disability, sexual harassment, discrimination based on sexual orientation and abortion law reform."

Gradually, she became the go-to resource for legal and policy insights, sought after by many.

During this time, her radar zeroed in on four issues needing reform - the law of sexual offences, the dual crises of domestic violence and sexual harassment in the workplace and abortion laws.

She took the lead on these matters, all the while educating the public on other incoming reforms benefitting women and families.

To bolster her efforts, she frequently appeared as a guest on TTT's Talk Show Issues and Ideas, hosted by journalist Tony Deyal.

"My television appearances were not without controversy, as some in the legal profession

believed public education was not a suitable role for a practicing attorney," she quipped.

Just as her foray into public education sparked debate among her peers, so too did the discussions on the need for legal reforms.

"There were intense discussions about the elimination of certain discriminatory provisions in the newly instituted 1986 Sexual Offences Bill. This sparked a heated national debate, particularly regarding rules that previously applied only to the evidence of women victims of sexual assault, which the new Bill aimed to amend. But of even greater debate was the recognition of rape within marriage," explained Seebaran-Suite.

This provision, she noted, was outlined in Clause 4 of the Bill, which led to the infamous Clause Four Debate. Seebaran-Suite wholeheartedly supported the move, using press and public forums to advocate that women should have control over their bodies.

Naturally, the Clause 4 debate led to discussions about domestic violence which she identified as "a pervasive crime of physical assault against women- one that many men at that time seemed complicit in ignoring."

Once again, Seebaran-Suite took a leading role in the debate, insisting Domestic Violence be recognized as a public interest issue and a police responsibility.

She engaged in a vigorous national discussion through various media, advocating for the establishment of an inexpensive and easily accessible mechanism for securing redress in the Magistrates Court in the form of the Protection Order.

"This initiative led to the passage of legislation in 1991 that created remedies for domestic violence, with substantial improvements in the ensuing years," she noted.

So deep was her passion to promoting women's rights that she once funded her own way to the 1985 UN Women's Conference in Nairobi, Kenya, securing a place on the official national delegation.

Seebaran-Suite's decades of advocacy and public education in gender and human rights for vulnerable groups resulted in numerous other milestones, including establishment of a Gender Based Violence Unit within the TTPS and her serving as Head of the Equal Opportunity Commission (EOC) from 2014-2020.

In 2012, these achievements earned her the National Award for Women Development, Gold, in the field of Law. In 2021, she was once again recognized for her outstanding contributions with an Honorary Doctor of Laws by the University of the West Indies.

Seebaran-Suite is quick to credit the collaborative efforts of colleagues, agencies and associates over the years, emphasizing her accomplishments would not be possible without them.

"I would be remiss not to mention the guidance and encouragement of my husband and mentor, Professor Emeritus Winston Suite since 1976," said the enthusiastic activist, recently reelected for a second year as President of the Law Association of Trinidad and Tobago (LATT).

As she continues leading her 1992 Law Firm – Seebaran Lynette and Co - , this Family Courts litigator shows no signs of slowing down and actively advocates for retirees to stay engaged in their communities.

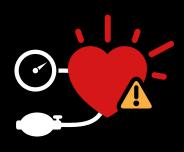

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Caribbean Christmas Eye Care Tips

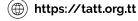
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Embrace Aging

Garlic Parmesan Pork Chops with **Cheesy Scalloped Potatoes**

Ingredients:

- 4 bone-in pork chops (about 1 inch thick)
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 4 cloves garlic, minced

Directions:

Preheat the Oven:

Preheat your oven to 375°F (190°C). Grease a baking dish for the scalloped potatoes.

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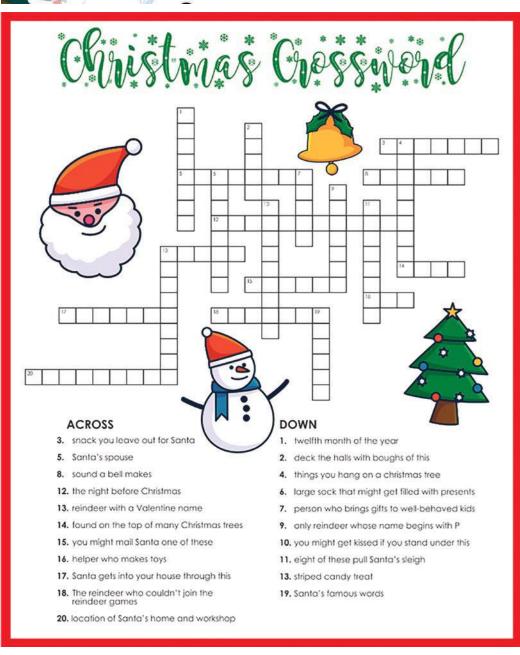
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
